INTRODUCTION TO THE PANEL DISCUSSION

World Communications Day is the only worldwide celebration called for by the Second Vatican Council, and is celebrated on the Sunday before Pentecost ... so we're a little early this year!



Each World Communications Day focuses on a particular theme, about which the Holy Father writes a message to the world. For 2025, that message was promulgated by Pope Francis and has as its title: "Share with gentleness the hope that is in your hearts."

In that message, the pope reminds us that "Hope is a hidden virtue, tenacious and patient. For Christians, it is not an option but a necessary condition."

He invites us, by way of media and communications, to get in touch with the best part of (our)selves and enter ... into the stories told. "Communicating in this way," he says, "helps us to become 'pilgrims of hope', which is the motto of the present Jubilee (year).


To help us get in touch with hope amid today's news, we've invited prominent journalists to share some thoughts from the viewpoint of areas in which they work.

Our third panelist is the Senior Fellow in the Catholic Studies Program at the Ethics and Public Policy Center in Washington. Formerly the senior advisor and special assistant to Archbishop Chaput, FRAN MAIER will be receiving this year's Cardinal Foley Award for Excellence in Communication. He'll speak with us about sharing hope in the Church.

The goal is for all of us to "enter into the story" and consider how we might become pilgrims at hope.
- Finally, we'll give our panelists the opportunity to close the symposium, as I invite each of them to offer a 5-minute conclusion.
